This newsletter will feature Coffey County Historical Society member is **Lonnie Bedwell.** 

Lonnie Bedwell joined the Coffey County Historical Society in 1985 and became a Lifetime Member in 1999. His donation of the Boot Legger's still is currently on display in the Cochran Gallery.

Lonnie was born near Eagle City, Oklahoma with the Cheyenne-Arapahoe Indians as his nearest neighbors. He recently made a two day trip to revisit his birth place and noted that it has changed from what he remembers. I asked Lonnie what the museum should be most proud of, as he felt that we should be proud of our well stocked "out back" historical buildings, pioneer artifacts and our beautiful entrance landscaping with pagoda.

Lonnie now lives in Wellington Kansas and is an active volunteer for their Historical Society and Museum.


## Introducing... Wilson Blow

## **Ottumwa Days**

Ottumwa celebrated it's 150 year as a town this past July 2005. Ottumwa was settled in 1855 by Thomas Bowen and was originally called Booneville until Bowen renamed it Ottumwa in honor of Ottumwa, Iowa. Built in 1863, Ottumwa was home to the Western Christian. The University was built for \$8,000. with all but \$2,000 being raised by Ottumwa. In 1868, the doors were closed to the college due to lack of funds. In 1872, the college was burnt down to the grown by an arsonist, and ended the honor of being a college community in Ottumwa.

Ottumwa at one time was a very busy and growing community. It was the home of three churches, the Christian, Methodist and Baptist. It was also home to the Ottumwa Journal. In 1857 the first newspaper was published in Coffey County at Ottumwa. Ottumwa also had the first horse powered sawmill in the county, a three story Hotel built which was built in 1856, and a general store was opened in 1857. Some believe that if not for the railroad going through Burlington instead of Ottumwa, that Ottumwa may have continued to be a booming town and possibly the county seat.

Even though Ottumwa's glory days are over there are 27 people who still live in the small community. There are also those who remember the good old days and enjoy the chance to get together and reminisce about Ottumwa's more prosperous times. Saturday July 16, 2005 was one of these times: Ottumwa hosted a picnic to celebrate its 150th year. Many people showed up to help celebrate Ottumwa's history and its contribution to the building of Coffey County. Reverend Bill Winters and his wife Leona were instrumental in arranging the days celebration.

## **Coffey County Fair**

On July 29, 2005, the museum staff participated in the parade celebrating Coffey County's 125th consecutively ran fair. The museum's float theme was "Covering History At Coffey County Museum" in which many personal quilts of Deborah and Kristin's were draped over the float.

Bob Saueressig lent us his trailer, and local artist Jim Stukey drew the outlining letters for the signs that were placed on the sides of the float. Once the letters were drawn, Courtney, Shirley, Kim and Kristin painted them in.

In addition to the quilts that Deborah and Kristin supplied, Kristin brought a wooden high chair, and a cradle that was made by her brother Clayton, and Kim's family let us use a metal framed bed.

The following day, Shirley, Kristin and Kim were at the fairgrounds selling quilt blocks for the memory quilt that is being put together to commemorate the Fair. This quilt will be on display at the museum when it is finished.

The outside door in the Pioneer Gallery does not leak any more. Jeff Fleming was able to fix it for us by putting a new weather strip along the bottom of the door.

Our windmill is pumping fine, it was a little slow earlier this summer, but the flow is where it should be now. We added some chemicals to keep the algae from forming and this seems to be keeping the pump and water clean and running smooth.

We have one of our air conditioning units shut off when a thunder storm comes through our area. This summer we were taught to reset this particular unit which saves us the aggravation of calling in a maintenance person.

The mowing is going fine this

summer. We hope the lawn shows how much hard work goes into it each week.

Below is a maintenance report outlining some of the problems that we are now needing to address. If anyone is willing to volunteer their time or funds to the museum to help us with some of the items from the list, please let us know!



- 1. Ramp for the church door way needs repaired.
- 2. Board walk south of the bridge has a board that will need fixed or replaced.
- 3. Church and school need painted both exterior and interior.
- 4. The board walk needs to be weather proofed.
- 5. The double steel doors in the Cochran addition leak at the bottom when it rains.
- 6. Loading dock door needs a new seal.
- 7. The ceiling of the shed needs calked.
- 8. Seam on the back wall of the storage room needs new calking.
- 9. Hot water tank under the sink in the men's room needs repaired.
- 10. Plumbing in men's restroom needs repair work.
- 11. Some of the galleries are in need of fresh paint.
- 12. We need carts made that would help in the moving of heavy artifacts from one location to another.
- 13. We need to slope the outside concrete at the base of the garage door.
- 14. Floors needed painted in most of the galleries and the back room.
- 15. Dirt to fill in low areas of the yard.
- 16. The yard needs a slope so that the water from the Church sump pump can drain properly.
- 17. Railing needs to be added for the loading dock steps leading to the loft area in the Asbury Gallery.
- 18. Eventually will need some of our light fixtures replaced.
- 19. Office, pantry, library are in need of carpet.
- 20. Sky light in Cochran Addition needs cleaned.
- 21. Honey comb and bee remnants need cleaned from inside the walls of the church.
- 22. Siding of the Church and school needs repaired/ replaced.
- 23. School floor needs striped and refinished.
- 24. Mold problem in the school entrance.
- 25. Gutters need to be cleaned, snow sealed, downspouts repaired and leaf guards added.
- 26. Metal benches need painted.
- 27. Bird bath needs painted.



#### Artifact of the Month



Patented in 1866, this rocker style iron was designed to crimp, ruffle and press pleats into fabrics by manually rocking the top of the iron over the bottom while the fabric was pressed in between the two. Fluting irons were widely used between the 1860's and 1880's.
