Lonnie Floyd Bedwell born August 2, 1912 in Eagle City, Oklahoma. Election Display

The 2008 presidential election is fast approaching. To commemorate the 2008 presidential election, an election display was created to highlight the museum's political campaign memorabilia as well as interesting historical information. We hope to provide evidence that supports how truly amazing it is how just one vote can really make a difference; so please do not forget that when election time comes around.

One of the centerpiece items on the display is a campaign torch from Benjamin Harrison's second campaign for presidency in 1892 against Grover Cleveland in which Grover Cleveland won. It is still in good condition and we are excited to be able to bring it out of storage for the general public to see. Displayed along side the campaign torch are numerous political buttons, political

ribbons and political postcards. The museum's collection of political buttons from gubernatorial, congressional, senatorial and presidential campaigns span from the years of 1904 through the present. Presidents with campaign memorabilia on display include Benjamin Harrison, William



McKinley, Theodore Roosevelt, William Howard Taft, Woodrow Wilson, Warren Harding, Herbert Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry

Truman, Dwight Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy, Richard Nixon, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, and George W. Bush.

The election display would not be complete without our three blackball ballot boxes. To vote by blackball, a person would vote for a candidate by placing a white ball into the ballot box and vote against the candidate by placing a black ball in the ballot box. This form of voting was typically seen in club organizations and fraternities but blackball voting has been around since the ancient Greeks and continues, yet, still today. The election display also has two tin ballot boxes used in Coffey County as well as a wooden ballot box.



A Letter from Walter Mayne

*Walter is our new full time Maintenance Superintendent at the Coffey County Historical Museum.

I am 48 years old and have been married for almost half of my life. My wife Jean is a former farmer's daughter who now works at Arnold's Greenhouse. After almost 24 years of marriage, this coming January 12, she deserves a medal and a lot of credit! We met after I moved from Michigan to Wichita, and then to Beloit Kansas for work. My home town is actually Alma, Michigan but I went to college in Detroit and graduated with a B.S. in Criminal Justice. Why the move? No jobs in Michigan in 1982 with the auto industry leaving the state and many opportunities out west in Kansas; of course it didn't hurt that I had family in Wichita to fall back on either.

I have worked with troubled youth in the "system" in a group home in Wichita, as well as at the Youth Center in Beloit as a Safety and Security Officer. I also have worked with the developmentally disabled, as well as with Pamida as a Store Team Leader. Pamida is actually what brought us here to Burlington.

After working for Pamida for 4 years I accepted an offer to run two stores in Columbus and Girard Kansas. After only 3 months of living in Pittsburg they offered me the store here in Burlington. So, we moved again. It's been an experience! Pamida and I parted ways and I managed Pizza Hut in Yates Center until I accepted the position of Superintendent here at the museum in March of this year.

I am enjoying not supervising people and working mostly with things...inanimate objects don't talk back and don't have problems getting to work on time! Since being here I have kept busy. A couple of projects that I have worked on are the butterfly flower gardens out front and the bird bath, as well as the flower boxes on the board walk. These were a joy to put in, especially since one of my hobbies is gardening. Of course the lawn and it's upkeep is an ongoing project and I usually enjoy it as well, especially since I am outside and get tanned and a good work out!

Perhaps one of my favorite areas of the museum though would be the Cochran gallery with it's rooms. Many items remind me of younger years at my grandparent's house and the many trips that my wife and I have taken to various museums and/or antique malls.

An interesting fact that not too many people know about me is that I have an identical twin brother. He lives in Covington, Louisiana and is nothing like me! Just ask Jean, she got the best of the pair!

Current Projects

Whenever someone asks what I do at the museum it's never hard to answer. We have had and still have many projects going on all the time. Just a short listing of projects and what has been happening follows: Planting and ongoing maintenance of flower beds and boxes; Pruning and caring for existing roses; Tree care.....this has been an effort with the winds and heavy rains that we have experienced. Not only have there been many branches trimmed and dead ones fall off, but we are now seeing some of the affects with bugs and caterpillars, (not the good ones) all over some of the trees; Lawn upkeep is always at the top of the list. We had a lot of mower problems early on, and like the saying, "nothing runs like a deere", our mower just plain refused to be consistent in running properly and had to be replaced. It served the museum well though, as I understand that it was 13 years old. What a legacy for the new mower. It is a nice one with a 54" cutting base and zero turn radius. With the lawn we have also been fighting dollar spots and brown patches as a result of all the water. It seems to be recovering and is looking nice; The Harold Holtz wishing well had to be reworked as time and the weather took it's toll; Melvin Cummings donated an old fire hydrant that had to be cleaned up for display. We are in the process of getting it ready to paint and are planning to provide a spot outside on which to place it. The air conditioning, heating, and humidity systems are being worked on. We already had one a/c unit replaced and they are moving along with going through the entire system and updating. It is our hope that it won't be long and we will be up and running with new digital controls that will provide many years of efficient and accurate service; We are currently working on preparing the outside of the church for painting and hope to have this done before the weather turns cold. With any luck, the school will be next. We have also started painting inside the Asbury gallery as well. Lots of paint and man hours to come!; Now, anyone have any other questions about what keeps the days full and me working full time?


