# Duane's House & His Treasures

Our staff has been working hard on going through the contents of Duane Fitch's home. As you can see from our before pictures on the next page, this is a huge task! While going through each room, we have found another room that we thought was a closet. Like the other rooms, this room was filled wall to wall with mystery boxes. We are about 3/4 of the way through his house and hope to be done by the end of spring/ beginning of summer!

There have been many treasurers found in his house and some of them are already on display in the museum. Some of the treasurers found are old toys ranging from the early to mid 1900's, comic books, glass soda bottles, stamps, musical instruments, jewelry, and depression glass.

Most of the old toys and comic books found in his house are in excellent condition. Right now, the comic books are on display in the Flint Hills Gallery, but only for a limited time due to the age and the effects that light has on artifacts. Since we have found so many toys, only a few are on display in the New Donations Display. We encourage everyone to stop in and look at these items from his boyhood.

One interesting find, was Madelyn's 1936 Burlington High School class ring. This is the only Burlington High School ring that

the museum has, so we are very excited to have it. For those who didn't know her, Madelyn was Duane's sister. She spent her entire life in Burlington. Madelyn

was born on April 3, 1919, and died on August 10, 1995. She graduated with honors from Burlington High School in 1936. Madelyn worked for two County Superintendents, and then hired as Deputy County Treasurer in 1949 and worked there until her death.

The depression glass that we have found from Duane's house can be found in the New Donations Display or in the 1950's Kitchen Display. Depression glass has been highly collectible since the 1960's, but not everyone knows the history of the glass. Depression glass is glassware that was distributed free or at low cost in the United States during the mid-

1920's to the early 1940's. The cost of a piece of this glass could be found as low as a loaf of bread. As an incentive to purchase a product, manufacturers would put a piece of the depression glass in boxes of their product. One could find a piece in the oatmeal box and then find another in their laundry detergent box. Businesses would hand out the glassware for simply coming in

the door or purchasing a certain amount.

The depression glass was mass-produced molded glassware that was of poor quality and often showed many flaws, yet it came in a range of colors and patterns to suit every taste. The most popular colors are pink, iridescent, cobalt blue, amber, and green. Most depression glass was made in the central and mid-west United States. There were more than twenty manufacturers that made more than one hundred patterns. Some of the popular makers of the depression glass were Fenton Glass, Westmoreland Glass, Federal Glass, and Hocking Glass Company.
