Banana Bread

Submitted by Florence Conrad Salisbury, Virginia, daughter of Mildred Conrad

1 C. sugar

1 egg

2 lg. very ripe bananas, mashed

½ C. pecans, chopped or ground*

pinch of salt

½ C. shortening

2 T. milk


1 tsp. baking soda

2 C. flour


***(Mildred usually did not add pecans.)**

Cream sugar and shortening; add egg and milk and mix well. Mix in bananas. Add dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Stir in nuts, if desired. Pour into greased and floured loaf pan (9 5/8 x 5 1/2-inch). Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 45-60 minutes, until a toothpick inserted near the middle comes out clean. Serve hot or cold, with or without butter. This recipe freezes well.



Mildred Craig Conrad is a lifelong resident of Coffey County except for a few years that she was in Lawrence for secretarial school and work and then as a "government girl" during World War II in Washington, DC, where she met her husband, Joe, a Pennsylvanian, who made Burlington his lifelong home. She found a great use for over-ripe bananas from Conrad's General Store in this banana bread recipe. Her sister, Laverne, used ground pecans, changing the flavor a bit, but not the texture. It is a Conrad family mainstay, much in demand by Mildred's great grandchildren who insist that their grandmother bring "Mamom bread" when she comes to visit and who themselves bake it.





