Snow

February is a month people start thinking about spring and flowers, but for Coffey County residents, February has been the month of snow. February 1st had Coffey County in blizzard warnings. The storm dumped more than nine inches in the area and strong winds caused major snow drifts. The museum had a large snow drift at the front door that was about two feet tall from this storm! The staff spent the

day clearing the sidewalks from the snow. With that weekend in the 40's, the rest of the month looked to be nicer weather, or so we thought. February 8, exactly a week later, brought another winter storm! The staff measured nine inches by four in the afternoon. The snow continued until the next day. Coffey County received 12 to 20 inches of snow. News reporters came to Burlington

and did a segment on the town and the snow. They reported that 16 inches of snow fell on the town. We measured more than 16 inches at the museum. Once again, the staff got back outside and removed the snow. Hopefully the snow is done for the rest of the year! Below are photos of the snow storm and its aftermath. Traveling Exhibit: The Atomic Age

The Coffey County Museum is receiving a traveling exhibit called "The Atomic Age: The Discovery & Evolution of Nuclear Science." The museum is planning on having the exhibit mid-April to the first part of June.

The atomic age began with a handful of scientist investigating radioactivity decades before the first atomic bomb exploded at the Trinity Test Site, New Mexico on July 16, 1945. The exhibit

describes the earliest discoveries by pioneering physicists, highlights the work of the scientists associated with the Manhattan Project, explores President Dwight D. Eisenhower's Atoms for Peace initiative to promote civilians uses of nuclear science, and examines the direct influence and impact of these events on modern Peaceful applications of nuclear science in energy and medicine.
