

Museum's Ghost

Shirley and Erin have spoken at several club meetings and to individuals about upcoming events. But the same topic keeps coming up, the museum's ghost. As you might have read in a past issue of the newsletter, the museum had paranormal investigators, Everyday-Legacy Paranormal, come out to investigate the museum for paranormal activity back in October. We asked them to come out because several people have reported hearing voices, footsteps, or feel like they are being watched. A couple of people have even reported being touched. said to happen when something paranormal is trying to get your attention or when it tries to do something paranormal. At one time, their walkie-talkies started to go off for no apparent reason. They said this has happened on a couple of other investigations when they experienced high levels of paranormal activity. When the team reviewed their equipment after the investigation, they discovered several EVPs that were captured. EVPs, or Electronic Voice Phenomena, are voices that are not heard at the time of recording but are captured by recording device so when the tape is played back you can hear unexplained voices. A Disembodied Voice is when you hear the voice aloud and you caught the voice on the recorder. Some people say EVPs can be explained by static, stray radio transmissions, and background noise and there is nothing paranormal about them. We will let you decide. Everyday-Legacy Paranormal has posted the EVPs on their website at www.everyday-legacy.com. If you go to

"Evidence" in the right column and then select "Coffey County Historical Museum" on the Evidence Page, you will view nine different recordings they captured during their investigation at the museum. Most of the recordings were taken from the Asbury Gallery and one was from the back storage room. One of the woman's voices was actually heard during the investigations, so on the recording you will hear towards the end two of the investigators trying to impersonate the voice they heard. Some say the woman sounds like she says "Hi, What's your name?" and then we are not sure what the last part is. You can visit their site and judge for yourself. The group is a non-profit organization and does not charge to investigate because to them it is a hobby and not a job.
