Election Results

The annual Coffey County Historical Society election of Board of Directors was held by mail -in ballots this year due to it being an odd year. On the ballot was a proposed Constitution change and two Board of Directors positions (Burlington and At-Large). The museum received 38 ballots out of the 268 ballots that were sent out in the mail in the August issue of the *Timelines*.

The proposed constitution change passed by a 33 to 4 vote. Tom Allen was elected to the Burlington position on the Board of Directors.

Eileen Coker was elected to the At-Large position. Both positions will served a three year term from 2013 to 2016. Allen and Coker officially started their positions on Thursday, October 10 during the regular monthly board of directors meeting.

Spiritual Dimensions

A crowd of 51 people came to the museum for "Spiritual Dimensions: Presentation with Readings by Traci Bray, Psychic Medium" on November 5. Visitors had an opportunity to view the exhibits at the museum before and after the presentation.

During the presentation, Traci discussed her work and life as a psychic medium and what led her to do what she is doing today. She talked about her first experience seeing someone that had passed. It wasn't until many years later that she did her first public reading. Her work

includes being a medium (connect the living and those who passed) and psychic (look into the present, past, or future). She also noted that she has also helped people with genealogy. Traci also discussed what she experiences when she does readings and her beliefs on different topics. Those in attendance were also able to ask Traci questions about her work. Traci then gave a gallery-style reading to the audience.

Veterans Display

Just a reminder that we still have a Veterans Display in the Flint Hills Gallery at the museum. When you enter the gallery, there is a display case full of casket flags and grave markers. The other display cases that surround the middle of the room and the table in the middle of the room contain artifact from the wars and conflicts. The cases start with the Civil War and end with Dessert Storm. On the table in the middle of the room is a scrapbook from Operation Iraqi Freedom, WWII Veterans from Lebo, and a statue.

Hanging from the ceiling in the middle of the room are the military branches flags. On the carpet walls above the display cases are photographs of Coffey County Veterans along with a little bit of information about the veteran. One section of the wall has the MIA/POW flag and with it, a photograph of Coffey County's MIA soldier, Henry Floyd Robinson.

The museum is still accepting photographs of Coffey County Veterans for our display. Here are the guidelines:

- ★ Coffey County Veteran is someone born in Coffey County or settled down in Coffey County.
- ★ Photo of Coffey County Veteran in military uniform or casuals.

- Include: name, rank, branch, dates/years served, what war/ conflict, and any other information.
- ★ Send by email: must be scanned at least 300 dpi resolution. Email to erin@coffeymuseum.org
- ★ Photographs can be brought into the museum to be scanned (you will keep your original).
 Photographs can't be larger than 8x10.
- ★ Photographs can be an outright donation to the museum.

Robert J. Dole Institute of Politics Accepting WWII Kansas Veterans Photos

In October, the staff at the museum went to the Kansas Museum Association (KMA) Conference in Lawrence, Kansas. The first night they toured several museums in Douglas County. One was the Robert J. Dole Institute of Politics at the University of Kansas in Lawrence. Inside of the building is a wall covered with photographs of WWII Kansas Veterans. There is also a kiosk where visitors can view all of the WWII Kansas Veterans that have been submitted to the institute. They are still accepting photographs of WWII Kansas Veterans for viewing in the Institute's Memory kiosk. The guidelines for submitting photographs for the Dole Institute of Politics are:

- Photo of Kansas WWII veteran in military uniform or casual.
- Include: Veteran's name and Kansas town considered "home;" (other military information is not placed in kiosk...only name & photo).
- Provide your contact name, email


- and/or mailing address.
- Let them know if veteran attended KU (KU association is not a requirement for inclusion in their photo collection.)
- Kansas WWII Veteran defined as— native born Kansans <u>or</u> a vet who settled in Kansas after WWII.

New books to the museum gift shop include:

- Letters for Healing: The Therapeutic Power of Writing to a Lost Loved One by Von Kopfman. This is a book of letters written to lost loved ones. The book also includes the Songs for Healing cd. The cd includes 15 songs based upon the book.
- •Shadow on the Hill: The True Story of a 1925 Kansas Murder by Diana Staresinic-Deane. It was the most brutal murder in the history of Coffey County, Kansas. On May 30, 1925, Florence Knoblock, a farmer's wife and the mother of a young boy, was found slaughtered on her kitchen floor. Several innocent men were taken into custody before the victim's husband, John, was accused of the crime. He would endure two sensational trials before being acquitted.
- Apron Strings and Family Ties by Ray Imhof & Doris M. Johnson. This

book is a follow up of "As I Remember It" which is also available at the gift shop. In the book "Apron Strings and Family Ties" Robert and Esther Imhof are faced with two difficult struggles right at the beginning of their marriage in 1933. These uphill forces were the Great Depression and the Dirty Thirties. These difficulties faced everyone in the Midwest, old and young alike. This book reveals how Robert and Esther met hardships head on with dignity, hard work, love for each other and family, perseverance, and courage. They share with you their joys and heartaches of marriage and raising a family from 1933-1996.

- The Cookie Crumb Trail by Doris Johnson. This is a children's book for ages 4-8. It follows the adventures of Larry and his duckling. Beautiful watercolor illustrations bring to life their adventure at the airport as they start a journey to visit grandma.
- *Chacho* by Doris Johnson. This unique children's book is sure to please every child young and old. The setting is deep in the forest. Chacho is a little boy who tries very hard to help and please his mother and

- grandmother. In spite of his efforts, he isn't quite able to follow their instructions. In the end he solves his dilemma in a simple and obvious way. Chacho is proud to have solved his own problem. The surprise ending is sure to bring a smile to the reader. The book beautifully illustrated by Dani Otten, a budding young artist. Dani is a 9th grader at Abilene, Kansas High School.
- *Kansas on Canvas* by Louis Copt. This is a 5x5.5 softcover book with an introduction by Jim Hoy and 48 pages of paintings by Louis Copt.
- The Flint Hills by Mark Feiden and Jim Hoy. This 9x9.5 softcover book includes 64 pages with an essay by Jim Hoy and photographs by Mark Feiden.

Church & School Fund Drive

Last issue of the *Timelines* we had a story and photographs of our Bethel Church and the Rural Dale School House foundation problems. Due to the extreme weather the last couple years, cracks inside the buildings are becoming more evident due to foundation problems. Some of the decorative rock on the foundation of the church are also becoming detached due to the shifting foundation. Cracks in the foundation of the schoolhouse are also becoming more noticeable.

After contacting several foundation companies, the museum concluded

that the buildings need lifted soon. It will cost around \$62,000 (worst case scenario) to get both the school and church raised. This includes removing and reinstalling the boardwalk so the companies can get their equipment in to lift the buildings. After this job is completed, the museum will need funds to repair the inside of the buildings.

Save the Bethel Church and the Rural Dale School House!



View fundraiser meters in the shape of the church and school to view the progress of raising the funds to lift the church and school. The church meter will get filled in first until we meet that goal and then the school house meter will fill up. We need \$35,200 to lift the church and \$29,350 to lift the school house. If we lift the two buildings together, then we receive a 5% discount making the total \$61,722.50. Note: These figures are based on "worst case scenario," if we have to go down 45 feet with both buildings. If the total when the project is completed is less than the amount raised through donations, the leftover money will be used to repair the inside of the buildings.
