Kansas Day 2018

The Coffey County Historical Museum's annual fundraiser, Kansas Day, will be held on Saturday, January 27th from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Children will have the opportunity to participate in Pioneer Activities from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The activities are free, but donations are greatly appreciated. Activities include rope making, candle dipping, butter churning, yarn dolls, and more. The train set in the Asbury Gallery will be running during this time.

A silent and a live auction will also take place during the event. The Live Auction will start at noon in the Pioneer Gallery. 2017 Election Results

There were two board positions that were up for election this year for the Coffey County Historical Society Board of Directors, the Waverly and Gridley positions. The election this year were done by mail-in ballots.

Georgia Masten joined the Board of Directors in February when she filled in the unexpired term of Sandra Reedy for Waverly. She ran unopposed for the Waverly position.

Johnnie Redding, Jr. won the Gridley position by write-in votes.

The 2018 election will be held during September with the results announced at the Annual Meeting on Monday, September 24, 2018. Up for election in 2018 is the LeRoy Position and Lebo Position.

Georgia J. Masten

Georgia has lived in Coffey County most of her life. She left in 1963 after graduating from Waverly High School and returned in 1968.

She was born at St. Mary's Hospital in Emporia, KS, and grew up on a farm in Northeast Coffey County, near Agricola. Georgia has two brothers. She is the middle child and only daughter.

Georgia attended the one-room school in Agricola from first grade to seventh grade. After the school closed due to lack of students, she attended Waverly Grade School for 8th grade, graduating in the second class to graduate from the new building in 1959. In 1963, she graduated from Waverly High School and moved to Kansas City, at age 17, to find a job. Georgia worked at Lynn Insurance until she turned 18 in August and could apply at Bendix Corporation. She worked there until she got married, in 1965, and moved to Garden City, MO, and later to Freeman, MO.

In 1967, Georgia finally convinced her husband to leave his

"Show Me State" and move to "The Land of Oz" where her parents lived. They raised their children around the Waverly area, where they all graduated from Waverly High School. They were blessed to be raised near their grandparents and had a special bond with them. They all live approximately an hour away. She has five grandchildren and one great grandson that lives in Newton.

Over the years, Georgia kept busy with various jobs around Waverly: the First National Bank, Sunset Manor Nursing Home, secretary at Berico Grain Drier Industries, para professional at Waverly schools, Site manager for Mid America Nutrition Program, substitute school cook, babysitting, cleaning houses, and manager of Country Corner Convenience Store for 16 years.

During the summer of 2000, the owner of Country Corner decided she needed to learn something about computers. She started taking college classes at Neosho County Community College in Ottawa. Georgia loved it so much that she continued and received an Associate Degree in 2004 just before she turned 59. With this degree, she was able to do some substitute teaching at the local schools.

In 2009, Georgia started to work part time as an Office Assistant at the Waverly City Hall where she still works present day.

Her hobbies include: oil and acrylic painting, gardening, reading (when she has time), traveling, spending time with family, and attending grandchildren's activities.

Georgia has enjoyed getting to know the gals at the Coffey County Museum and other board members. She said it has been very enlightening to learn of the operating procedures including the good reports as well as the problems. She thoroughly enjoyed taking part in the Kansas Day activities last year. With her business degree as well as job experiences, she feels that she can be an asset to the board. It is her hope to bring more awareness of the museum and its activities to the Northeast corner of Coffey County.

Johnnie E. Redding, Jr.

Johnnie E. Redding, Jr. was elected by write-in ballot to represent the Gridley area on the Board of Directors. His interest in history motivated him to consider serving on the board.

He was born in Oklahoma and came to Kansas with his family in 1957 at the age of 11. He attended Oil Field (a two room school), being one of the last three students to graduate 8th grade before it closed. He graduated Gridley High School in 1964.

He served in the United States Air Force and was stationed in Northern Thailand with the 388th Tac Fighter Division during the Vietnam War. He has been married to Pat for 51 years. They have two sons, five grandchildren, and two great grandchildren who all live in Coffey County.

Johnnie has been an active farmer, oil producer, owned a TV appliance shop in Gridley, has retired from the U.S. Postal Service in Madison, and is currently owner of RC Trucking Inc. with his oldest son.

He is a current member of the Coffey County Fire Board, Hebron Lodge 314, American Legion Post 0296 and serves on the Board of Elders and Deacons at the Gridley Christian Church. He has also served on the USD 245 School Board.

Church & School Restoration

Funds are still being raised to help restore the church and school. The buildings received a foundation lift in 2013. The splits in the siding on the buildings were filled to temporarily fix it until we have funds to replace the boards in poor condition with new boards.

The interior of the building still needs repair. The fundraising events, Night at the Museum: Gatsby Edition, Night at the Museum: Sock Hop Edition, and Kansas Day, were fundraisers for the restoration of the buildings.
